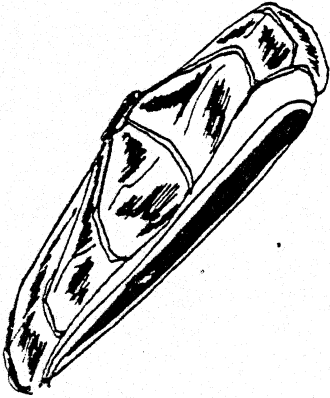

Bonjour!

I received TAMs & tissues, MAR 10 1982 today... It is very interesting but I do not understand why you sent it to Les Sourcières!

Les Sourcières is a group of women; we have a newsletter on spirituality and feminism; we organize activities, concerts, danses, picnics... All this is for women only... Most of us are lesbians, some are not... but we are all women...

Personnally, I have nothing against men who dress and wear make up "like women"... the only thing is, I am not sure it is really "like women"... The love of disguise and masquerading is in every child, it is great fun... some of us loose this love of "halloween" when we grow up, some of us keep it (it seems to me it is a treasure!); If I could wear a costume, I ~~would~~ have fur, long tail, long nails, whiskers, cute little ears, and a "purring machine"... but as it is too much trouble, I am contented to live with Nugly-cat and Diana-cattess. It is easier for men to find women's things, and if it makes them feel good and be happy, theyMUST do it! I guess most men are too rigid and frustrated, that is what makes them so intolerant; if transvestism makes some men different, that is a very good thing indeed!

In "Qu'il était doux le temps du matriarcat!" (in french Châtelaine, octobre 77), Ginette Paris wrote (my translation):

military music, short hair, (...) trees in a straight line, square buildings, (...) gray suits, symmetry, (...) uniforms and clothing regulation in every small detail (...) are expressions of patriism. (...) In patrists, we see a restraint of movements, gestures, voice... dances, songs, colourfull dressing, decorations, masquerades, love of the "hazy" (in french: l'amour du flou), of the deep forest, of assymetry, of what is round, are an expression of matrism...

In GOD HERSELF, the feminine roots of astrolody (an Avon pocket book, #0-380-56143-3 \$3.95), Geraldine Thorsten writes that a few thousands years ago, our great-great-great-grand-fathers who were chosen as priests or kings wore feminine dresses and jewels to show they were "in powerful situation", somewhat goddesslike...

But what I think is not stressed enough in your newsletter --I have only one ^{issue} copy, so maybe I am talking through my hat-- is the need to change the values of this society: we need freedom from the sex roles and stereotypes, and this freedom can come only with a change of values and definitions.

In our society, there is only one way to be a male; "heterosexual and macho". If you are different, you are queer, pervert, things like that... The sex roles for women are no less stringent: OK I can wear pants, but I cannot work in any trade I would like, or go everywhere without the fear of being harrassed, raped, attacked in different ways... If I say out loud that I am a lesbian, I have to be very careful...

So, I think transvestites should work to bring this change of values and stereotypes, not promote them. I read things like:

the small fraction of homosexual transvestites get most of the public attention with their ABERRANT behavior (second page)

Why is a gay transvestite more ABERRANT than a straight one? The story never tells... Or, in "Myths of cross-dressing"

If you were really a homosexual you would be seeking a partner almost constantly

How is that for a MYTH? I am a lesbian, and I am not constantly looking for a sex partner... and I know many gay men who have jobs (where they WORK, not flirt) and do many things other than looking for sex, or should I say fast-sex (like in fast-food) (if they spend their life looking for it, they must do it real fast, or never find...)

I think that, if transvestites want the right to live in our society, they must recognize the right of others to live as they want:

right of the gays

right of having or not having a baby (contraception, abortion...)

right to say "no" to a sexual invitation

right to dress like we want, have the kind of hairdo we like, wear make up or not

right to enter "non traditional" trades, for men and women

right to say no to religion courses in school

right to have sexual education in the school that is positive about other ways of living our masculinity and our femininity

etc

If, like you write, a transvestite in his "male costume" looks like any other man, it should be quite easy (well, as easy as it is for feminists, lets say...) to work at changing the "rules of the game"... at trying new definitions of being a man or a woman, at accepting that, for exemple, gay men, "effeminate" men, are OK, that it is simply a different way of being a man (who ever saw a woman acting like an "effeminate" man? What we call "grande folle" in French is a different "kind" of man, not a woman!)

On your last page, you printed a small thing "Sex Change Surgery Changes Income, Too" Do you think this would be a good thing for transvestites to work on? That proves that the difference in income is based on gender and not on the personality of the worker, so it might be as good a place to begin than any other...

Sorry, but we will win together, all of us "non conformist", or we will loose together! As well work on it, so we can win...

Please, do not send your newsletter to Les Sourcières anymore, as we stop our publication with the issue that comes out at the end of the month... and transvestism is not one of my priorities. I used to be a "jill of all trades", but now I try to concentrate on the most important things for me, as I do not have enough time to work on everything. My priorities for now are the awakening of the Goddess (neo-paganism) and lesbianism, seen in the larger pattern of creating a new society, with new values...

More accurate words regarding the change that occurs in my personality when I'm dressed could probably not be found. As a male, I used to be sad, I used to be shy, but as a woman, I'm alive, vibrant and full of life. Sounds simple, doesn't it? Put on a dress, a wig and makeup and voila. Well voila does not come that easily.

I've been attending the group regularly for close to two years. For close to two years I have not dressed. Initial anxiety and not knowing anyone was a reasonable excuse at first not to dress. After that, the excuse became the standard, "well I have no clothes/wardrobe", and "I don't know how to put on makeup". However, more importantly I was not yet ready to dress, it did not feel right as I was just beginning to discover my true self.

Virtually each meeting I attended I was given a more pertinent version of the line, "take my wife please!" Everyone was willing to help dress me, everyone except me. Even I was beginning to think I was a mole for the RCMP. In the meantime I simply told everyone that I would dress when I was ready. At the rate I was going you probably could have found an 80 degree day in December.

Finally that 80 degree day came, though you won't find it any weather log. The time had come where I got the courage to go out and buy some clothes and had decided that I wanted to dress. The important word is, I wanted. I finally had come to the point where I knew what I wanted to do and knew what I needed to do. The desire and need had actually been deep inside of me for years and years and I knew eventually I would. And finally I did.

My male and female sides are virtually exact opposites. As a woman I am the person I should be, while as a male, I am truly unhappy. So when I came as a woman to the last meeting for the first time, the difference in myself was amazing. You, even I, (had you known-me) would not believe the change in personality - saying that the difference was like night and day would be an understatement.

An important factor in this overall picture is the fact that my body and facial features are well suited to being a woman. With a very good makeup job, the result is excellent. I pass quite easily and this certainly plays a fairly large role in how I feel as a woman. Combining a very good 'look', and the right frame of mind on my part (where I want to be the woman I truly feel I am), the euphoric feeling was amazing. Never in my life can I remember feeling so great, so high, so joyful and ALL I did was dress. Well that's not actually true, all I did was take one of the early steps that will eventually allow myself to become the true me.

To end off, I'll use another line from the opening lyrics of the CBS series, Alice, as there is nothing more appropriate:

"...This girl is here to stay
for awhile." Quite awhile.

VICTOR/VICTORIA

For those who have followed the films of Blake Edwards, you may have noticed a common denominator aside from the fact that his wife, Julie Andrews, has played the lead in his more recent films. In the Pink Panther Strikes Again there is a butler who performs in drag, in the Revenge of the Pink Panther, Inspector Clousseau is accosted by a gorgeous TV and in S.O.B., there are a few references and scenes which include transvestites. Apparently there is an interest by Blake Edwards regarding Transvestism and this could partially explain some of the reasoning behind his latest release.

In Victor/Victoria, Julie Andrews portrays a woman pretending to be a man pretending to be a woman. Now if you still remember Ms. Andrews from The Sound of Music and as Mary Poppins, this should surely change your opinion of her. The point of Blake Edwards previous movie, S.B.O. - Where Julie Andrews bares her breasts, was to change Julie's lily white image. Victor/Victoria illustrates that this change is not a one-shot deal, while also aptly showcasing the many talents of Julie Andrews.

Playing a down and out singer, Victoria (Julie Andrews) accidentally crosses the path of a gay nightclub singer excellently portrayed by Robert Preston. With both of them broke Preston soon suggests that Victoria should pretend to be a man pretending to be a woman - a brainstorm he gets when he sees Victoria put on one of his suits out of necessity. The rest is history as Victoria becomes Victor who becomes Victoria on stage and is a phenomenal success. That is the essence of the film which also includes a tremendously stunning performance by Lesly Ann Warren as THE dumbest blonde that has

ever existed, and, another well played role by James Garner as King Martin the nightclub owner who is not sure whether he has fallen in love with a man or a woman.

You may say that it is very easy for a woman to pretend to be a woman. However, Julie Andrews not only does a convincing job of playing a man, but she even manages to convince you that she is truly a man portraying a woman. As a female impersonator her makeup and costumes make her look better than she has ever appeared before. She looks more feminine than Julie Andrews ever has and she also appears more graceful than ever. Further when she pulls off her headpiece after a performance there is no doubt she is a he, even though he is a she.

Victor/Victoria is a very well done film which covers both female and male impersonation. We are shown the lifestyle of a female impersonator on stage and living as a male, while we are also shown the power a woman obtains living as a man. Further, it covers the lives of gay character portraying them as normal human beings, in fact if anyone is truly caricatured, it is the heterosexual roles. As I stated, Lesly Ann Warren does a smashing portrayal of a dumb blonde, playing it to the hilt, yet realistically. King Martin (James Garner) has problems with people's perception of him as they think he is dating a man. Victor/Victoria shows that straight people have problems and that gays enjoy themselves. It is the gays who are normal and the straights are confused. True gays do have problems, but it is nice to be shown that we can also enjoy ourselves.

Blake Edwards has taken an important subject and handled it excellently while lacing it with humour, a marvellous combination. Perhaps we can look forward to more TV roriented movies from him in the future. It is only too bad that they have already recast the role of the late Peter Sellers with another male, otherwise they could possibly given Inspector Clousseau a sex-change.

Victor/Victoria is a film you should go see, if only for the fact that it is two hours of pure entertainment. However, it has a lot more to offer and just as importantly, good movies on such subjects are few and far between.
